

SOUTH SUDAN CRISIS

A YEAR ON-2014



KEY ACHIEVEMENTS



The above pictorial shows the key achievements in the different thematic areas; education, child protection and NFIs.



December 15th 2014 marked exactly one year since the break out of the war in South Sudan, leaving thousands of children and women displaced. To date, Uganda hosts one of the biggest refugees population, with a total of 128,600 refugees, most of whom are in 3 settlements of Adjumani (81,211), Arua (11,802), Kiryandongo (28,741), and 6,846 self settled in Kampala.

In light of this, Save the Children has continued to support the South Sudanese emergency response to date. The situation kicked off tensely at that time but in collaboration with the stakeholders, a lot has been achieved in the last one year as indicated below;

Child Protection

- ◆ To date 19 (Child Friendly Space) CFSs have been constructed, 10 in Adjumani, 5 in Arua and 4 in Kiryandongo and 8 are fully functional
- ◆ A total of 4,604 children have been registered, out of these, 2,276 children attend the CFS daily and 2,760 benefit from other child protection activities.
- ◆ Over 57 staff and volunteers have overtime received training to enable them work in the CFS
- ◆ Established 14 community-based child protection networks/structures
- ◆ 227 community members are actively participating in community based Child Protection structures,
- ◆ 4,876 community members are now participating in sessions aimed at raising awareness on child protection
- ◆ 3360 community members have participated in sessions on Family Tracing Reunification (FTR); 433 children have been reunified.
- ◆ 1,849 children have been identified and registered as separated

Education Sector

- ◆ 5 centres have been set up for learners
- ◆ 5 ECCD centres are currently being supported by technical teams
- ◆ 1086 learners are being shored up through education activities
- ◆ 51 Care givers have been trained in Education in Emergencies
- ◆ 5 Care givers trained on child protection and development
- ◆ 28 Center Management Committees have been established with 60 members trained


WASH sector:

- ◆ The number of sanitation and hygiene campaigns conducted were 140
- ◆ Constructed 24 pit latrines of 3 stances each
- ◆ 1,680 sanitation and hygiene campaigns were carried out
- ◆ Constructed latrines for Persons with Special Needs (PSNs)
- ◆ 15 latrines have been de-sludged
- ◆ Have distributed jerry cans, soap and other items.

Nutrition:

- ◆ 4 Mother-Baby Friendly Spaces (MBFS) have been established
- ◆ 4,697 Mother / Child pair (0-23 months) have been assessed and referred for IYCF support

The pictorial below shows how the situation has been managed right from the onset of the crisis in December 2013 to date. The refugees started out in cramped make shifts (camps), but to date majority have been resettled in camps and given both food and non-food items to start a new life in Uganda.
